

In April, we celebrate Hanamatsuri (literally Flower Festival), which commemorates the birth of Siddartha Gautama, who would eventually become the Buddha. Legend tells of the auspicious birth in Lumbini's Garden when all the flowers burst into bloom and sweet tea rained from the sky. Thus, our tradition is to have a statue of the baby Buddha in the Hanamido (literally Flower Hall) which is decorated in flowers. It is the one time a year that we pull this special statue out of storage and have a unique and ornate offering. Recently, I have developed a newfound appreciation for this statue.

The truth of impermanence means we are losing more and more of the Nisei generation as they, as a whole, grow older. There is a small silver lining here, though, as we begin to uncover more about their lives, especially their early lives, after they pass away. And one aspect which, although we do speak about it frequently, was often not mentioned in life, is the time in the internment camps. So, learning more about this difficult but influential time for our predecessors opens insight into their sacrifices and also their ingenuity.

Practicing Buddhism was all but forbidden in camp. They didn't want Japanese to be spoken for fear of spy messages being spread and of course there was no altar area available. This did not stop the services from happening and they did with what they had. At one camp, a man snuck into the kitchen and carved a baby Buddha out of a carrot and other internees combined the sugar they were rationed to make sweet coffee

To me, more than how fancy the set-up may be, the care and effort put into these altars would make the Buddha smile. It reflects their dedication and how much they treasure the Buddhist teachings — that no matter what situation they get put in, they revere and take refuge in the Buddha-Dharma. It is a lesson for me and for all of us to recognize how fortunate we are currently and to reexamine our own devotion to the teachings.

ast month, I wrote about the Buddhist Churches of America (BCA) National Council meeting that was organized by the Northern California temples and hosted by our temple. Over 200 delegates, ministers and guests from all over the BCA, Canada and Hawaii descended upon our temple from Friday, February 23 through Sunday, February 25. Since that weekend, we have received many congratulatory messages and words of appreciation for hosting this event. Participants have commented on how organized the event was, how smoothly everything ran, how hospitable the hosting temples were, how wonderful the food was, and how great it was for everyone to be together again. It was so nice to see people reconnecting after three years of virtual National Council meetings, and others meeting for the first time after seeing each other on a computer screen the last three years.

Highlights of the weekend included a special appearance by the Grateful Crane Ensemble, who performed a musical written specifically about the BCA's 125-year history. The show ended with over 200 people attending the Saturday night banquet Obon dancing to Tanko Bushi.

On Sunday morning, the BCA Eitaikyo Service included a special ceremonial chant led by Bishop Marvin Harada and Reverend Yuki, and a meaningful message from newly retired minister Reverend Ron Miyamura from the Midwest Buddhist Temple in Chicago. At this service, our Betsuin Choir debuted the gatha "Amida's Light." The lyrics to "Amida's Light" were written by our own Gayle Kono, who was the winner of the BCA's Gatha Lyrics Writing Contest Adult Division in 2023. Professional composer Shinji Eshima wrote music to Gayle's lyrics and our Betsuin Choir learned the song and performed it at the Eitaikyo service. Composer Eshima attended the service to hear "Amida's Light" for the first time. In a thank you note to the Betsuin, he commented on how he was so moved by the entire Eitaikyo service and thanked the choir for the beautiful presentation of "Amida's Light."

Thank you again to the members of our Board of Trustees, Adult Buddhist Association (ABA), Sacramento Buddhist Women's Association (SBWA), Boy Scout Troop 50B, Girl Scout Troop 569, the Betsuin Choir, our church staff, the members of the Northern California temples, and the BCA National Council Meeting steering committee for all their hard work that resulted in a successful National Council Meeting! We will now be able to rest up for another six years or so before we need to do this all over again!

He also shared that when he misbehaved, his folks reminded him that "Amida Buddha will be sad if you do that."

And so this was the Jodo Shinshu community that shaped him.

Reverend Yuki went on to explain how culture cultivates our minds, and how he cultivated his mind with Buddha at the center.

"This teaching became the discipline of my daily actions," he said.

We're celebrating our temple's 125th Anniversary with caps, cars, coins, and more!



Another Girl Scout cookie season has come to an end. The girls learned money management and worked on their communication skills while earning money to use





煩悩の林に遊びて

この記事を書いているのが3月の頭ですが、ここ数日、度重なる訃報を耳にします。まず、世界的に人気のある漫画である『ドラゴンボール』の作者である鳥山明氏が3月1日に亡くなられました。鳥山明氏は『ドラゴンボール』のみならず、スクエアエニックスのn人気RPGゲームシリーズ、『ドラゴンクエスト』のキャラクターデザインもされていました。

私が小・中・高と学生時代を過ごしたのはこれらの漫画やゲームの全盛期で、友達と当時『ドラゴンボール』が連載されていた集英社の漫画誌『ジャンプ』を読んだかどうかを毎週話し、



『ドラゴンクエスト』はクリアしたかどうか、などの話をして盛り上がっていたのを覚えています。中でも『ドラゴンボール』の主人公である孫悟空が超(スーパー)サイヤ人という伝説のサイヤ人になった際の日本中の子供達の興奮はすごいものでした。今後、鳥山明氏が作る新しいキャラクターを見ることが出来ないのは非常に寂しい事であります。

また鳥山氏の訃報から翌日の3月2日には声優のTARAKOさんが亡くなられました。TARAKOさんが声優をされていた『ちびまる子ちゃん』のアニメが放送開始されたのが1990年、これもまた私が小学生の頃でした。音楽の授業や吹奏楽で主題歌の「おどるポンポコリン」を歌ったり演奏したのを今でも覚えています。これらの2人が亡くなられたという事実は一つの時代が終わった事を示しているようであります。







『ドラゴンボール』は一見すると孫悟空が戦いを通してさらに強くなっていく物語に思えますし、『ちびまる子ちゃん』はまる子の失敗や日常の些細な出来事を面白おかしく描いているように思えます。しかし、その根底に流れているのは「人との繋がり」の大切さではないかと思います。

こないだインターネットで記事を見ていると 『ドラゴンボール』の孫悟空の技の話がありました。悟空の技の中に「元気玉」という技があります。これは世界中の皆から少しずつ元気を分けてもらって一つの大きなエネルギーにしていくものです。世界中の人達のエネルギーと共に強敵を倒していく姿はやはり『ドラゴンボール』は「人との繋がり」の物語であったんだ、というような内容だったと思います。

私はこれは浄土真宗でも同じだと思います。私たちの先立っていった家族や友人はこの世から消えて行ったのではなく、私たちをお念仏の道へと導くお働きとなってくださったのです。私たちと家族や友人の繋がりというのはその人がこの世から亡くなったからといって終わっていくのではありません。

『浄土論』という天親菩薩の著作の中には「煩悩の林に遊びて」という言葉がありますが、阿弥陀如来のご本願のお働きによって摂い取られたお念仏の行者は阿弥陀如来のお浄土で仏と成らせていただき、この煩悩の林である娑婆世界へと(姿なき姿で)戻り、他を導いていくのです。「人との繋がり」が阿弥陀如来のお働きにより私たちの命が尽きるその時まで消えることなく、姿形を変えながら私たちを導いてくださるお働きとなってくださるのです。
