

his month, the Sacramento Betsuin is putting on a fundraiser for humanitarian efforts to help the people of Ukraine. It will be on Saturday, August 13, at 2 p.m. called "Songs in Solidarity with Ukraine" and feature performances of song.

The event is free, but donations are welcome to go to the cause. The reason for this event is, of course, the ongoing conflict with Russia. The Buddhist Churches of America Ministers Association has put out a statement on the conflict as follows:

"Guided by the Buddhist principles of Wisdom & Compassion, the Ministers Association of the Buddhist Churches of America opposes the Russian invasion of Ukraine. Buddha taught that Greed, Hatred, and Ignorance are poisons, and we see all three fueling this war.

"Wisdom recognizes that all things are Interconnected, and the fallout from this war will affect not only the innocent civilians and refugees but so many others as well, from the soldiers on both sides, to the environment and to the entire world.

"Buddha's Compassion recognizes that all life has value and happiness for all beings is the ideal. This is seen in the Metta Sutta with the aspiration, 'May all beings be happy — May they be joyous and living in safety.' Our founder, Shinran Shonin, expressed the wish, 'May there be peace in the world.'

"We are in favor of relief to the victims, and call for this war to end."

To add to the statement, I believe that the ambitions of nations is the result of the ignorance of individuals. When we look at ourselves, we see that we care deeply about us. We want to be happy and healthy. We want food, shelter, and things that bring us joy. However, we do not stop at the minimum nor are we ever satisfied.

The Buddha said that even if it rained gold coins, we would not be fulfilled. Human nature is to be voraciously selfish. And, on the contrary, the world and everything in it are finite. Thus, we come into conflict when we want something that makes another happy for ourselves because they will put up resistance. This seems quite common sense but, even so, we have not found a different way.

Mikhail Piotrovsky, the director of the State Hermitage Museum in St. Petersburg, said, "We are all militarists and imperials" when asked about a pacifist position. I think that this is built into not just the Russian culture but in American, Japanese, and many others of our cultures: to fight and take until we can rule the world.

Thus, we must search ourselves for the source of this conflict and uproot it at the cause. The Buddha said, "Searching all directions with your awareness, you find no one dearer than yourself. In the same way, others are thickly dear to themselves. So you shouldn't hurt others if you love yourself."

Ironically, by understanding how much we care about ourselves, we begin to understand why we should care about others. That if they love themselves as much as we love ourselves, how could we possibly impose on anyone? Then comes the action from such a realization. It is wonderful that we have opportunities to give funds to those that need help, and I am proud of our temple for putting on such a show of solidarity. On top of this, we must continue to live in a way that does not hurt others, raise our children to live the same way, and make sure that those that represent us share those values. In doing so, we can create a nation and, hopefully, a world that believes that it is possible for all of us to coexist in a peaceful way.

It is great to be able to start my article by saying that this summer is off to an ACTIVE start. Last month, I shared with you the success of our Annual Families and Friends Picnic in June. Today, I am very happy to share that July 9 brought our first in-person Bon Odori in three years — and we were thrilled to welcome about 600 people who came out to dance and to honor ancestors and loved ones who have passed away.

The weather was perfect and, combined with starting an hour later than has been our tradition, we found that we really did not miss having the "big tent" overhead to protect us from the usually intense July sun and HEAT. Some even commented on how nice it was to have the open sky! The Troop 50 Scouts, boys and girls, and Pack 50 Cub Scouts and Jr. YBA, supported the event by providing concessions and you, in turn, supported them in their successful fundraising efforts. Our youth organizations have always been important at the Betsuin and we were only too glad to be able to provide an opportunity for them to be part of our larger temple community.

Just about everything at the Betsuin takes a tremendous amount of volunteer time and effort and Obon Night was no exception. From working on committees to painting lines, from coordinating concessions to dressing dancers, from leading the dancers to providing the music, from making yukatas, uchiwas and tenuguis ("gear") available to purchase to livestreaming the evening festivities so more people could enjoy and celebrate with us — Bon Odori was possible only because so many people volunteered to make it a reality. A very special shout-out to our Betsuin Technology Committee, especially Kelly Gartman, for their tireless work to make the virtual presentation and our first-ever Obon Memorial Tribute Video a reality. Thank you all!

The next morning, we observed our Hatsubon (First Obon) Service, welcoming Reverend Bob and Reverend Patti back to the Betsuin as our special guest speakers. The hondo was at capacity, with overflow into the kaikan, and even more people attending online. It was a beautiful service, honoring those who have passed since our last Hatsubon Service in July 2021.

On July 14, we held our Annual Sacramento Buddhist Church Golf Tournament at Dry Creek Golf Course in Galt with 143 golfers participating. Everyone had a very enjoyable day golfing, drinking and eating the bento boxes that were part of our golfing package. Kudos to the Golf Tournament Committee for another great event!

We are welcoming August with a little break as we catch our breath and work to bring our first-ever Drive-Thru Bazaar to fruition. The event is coming up on September 18, and you'll find much more information in this newsletter, as well as online at our website. Hopefully you have already submitted your preordered food purchases, as quantities are limited!

In September, we will be moving back to in-person Dharma School! I should have registration forms and information out by the time you are reading this. The British Schindler's Acts of Selfless Giving

Trecently heard this story on NPR and thought about how selfless acts can have profound impacts much later that we may never become aware of. We are often bombarded by media stories of the rich and famous, but how often do we hear of amazing feats accomplished by everyday people, especially when there is seemingly little personal benefit to do so? The following is a remarkable story only becoming known due to chance. The selfless acts of Nicholas Winton to save 669 Jewish Czech children on the eve of World War II would not be known today were it not for his wife cleaning their attic and coming across a briefcase full of old documents and sharing them with a Holocaust researcher in 1988.

In December 1938, Winton was a 29-year-old London stockbroker set to go on a Swiss ski vacation when a friend called asking him to forgo his planned vacation and visit him in Czechoslovakia instead. His friend was an associate of the British Committee for Refugees from Czechoslovakia, which provided assistance for refugees created by the German annexation of the Sudeten regions. Winton witnessed the conditions of the refugee camps filled to capacity with Jews and political opponents from the Sudetenland and knew that Czechoslovakia would soon be taken over by Germany and the Jews would be deported to concentration camps.

Moved by what he saw, Winton set up the "unofficial" Children's Section of the British Committee for Refugees from Czechoslovakia, raised funds for transports, and found British families willing to care for refugee children. One day before the Germans occupied the Czech lands in March 1939, Winton was able to travel back to London and continued to organize the operations, setting up the train transports out of Prague, across Germany, into the Netherlands, and then by ship to Britain. Within eight months' time before the Germans invaded Poland and Britain declared war on Germany on September 3, 1939 and the borders were closed, Winton was able to transport 669 children out of Prague. Most of these children never saw their parents again and would undoubtedly have been sent to concentration camps and subsequently to their deaths.

Once the war started, Winton joined the Royal Air Force and eventually became a pilot. After the war, he worked for the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, met his future wife and married in 1948. It was not until 1988, when his wife found a scrapbook and documents with all the children's photos and names that his story became known when she shared them with a Holocaust researcher. Up until then, Winton had not let others know what he had accomplished.

Once the story of his courageous endeavors became known, Winton received a letter of appreciation from the late Ezer Weizman, former president of the state of Israel, and was made an honorary citizen of Prague in the independent Czech Republic. In 2002, Winton received a knighthood from Queen Elizabeth II for his services to humanity and was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize. Many of the children saved went on to do remarkable things, such as author Peter Sis, British politician Alfred Dubs (Baron), geneticist Renata Laxova, and the co-founder of the Israeli Air Force, Hugo Marom.

While the efforts and actions of Winton are remarkable, just as remarkable is the fact that he did not think what he did was out of the ordinary and his actions would not be known except for the chance finding of his old documents. Winton's inspirational life story reminds me of Jodo Shinshu Buddhist teachings I have heard through the years. One teaching that stands out is about letting go of one's ego. Winton acted upon his conscience and lived selfless giving without ever expecting acknowledgment or appreciation from anyone outside of himself. Neither did he even need any personal affirmation of his selfless efforts as he never had any expectations of those 669 children, and he never thought for any moment that anybody was obligated to him. The 669 saved children went on to live their lives and have families and at last count numbered around 15,000 who would not be alive were it not for Winton. Sir Nicholas Winton died in 2015 at the age of 106.

Sir Nicholas Winton is a true example of dana whose actions made a lasting impact on the world and humanity. His story can serve as an inspiration for all of us to continue selfless giving with actions that will guide and support the next generations.






