
Resident Minister Rev. Matt Hamasaki



In the month of December, we will be celebrating Bodhi Day, or the commemoration of the day that the Buddha attained enlightenment. This is important for us as Buddhists because the realization that Siddhartha Gautama had about the reality of existence is what made him the "Awakened One" or Buddha and he began to teach this understanding, which laid out the way for all of us to follow.

Although he went through many different teachers and paths to find what he was looking for (the end of suffering), he could not find it. He was so devoted in his pursuit that he partook in incredibly difficult practices that emaciated his body. After many years of this, Siddhartha learned he would not find the answer he sought this way. After leaving this path of penance, he went to the river to bathe himself, collapsing from exhaustion under a tree. A milkmaid, Sujata, gave him some kheer, an Indian rice porridge, that revitalized his body, and nursed him back to health. With his energy restored, he sat under the tree and meditated, resolving not to get up until he found the truth he wanted. And that is how he attained enlightenment.

An integral person to the story is Sujata, the milkmaid who nursed the Buddha to a state that he would be able to reach his goal. Her selfless actions are celebrated in different sects of Buddhism by serving kheer during their Bodhi Day ceremonies. Growing up, this was not the tradition at my temple, nor was it one that I was aware of at any others. Being someone who loves food (especially rice and porridge) I was intrigued as to what this kheer would taste like. (Continued on page \geq)

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Resident Minister (Continued)	Looking at recipes, traditionally it is made by cooking rice in milk with the addition of sugar or honey as sweetener, and cardamom as a spice which is often used in Indian cooking. Then it is topped with nuts and sometimes raisins. However, in Japan, it starts with okayu, a rice porridge, which milk is then mixed into and then the sweetening ingredients. Of course, there are also places that make it more traditional and have the cardamom, but it's interesting to me to see how the culture has adapted this dish with foods that are more indigenous.





Unless otherwise specified, donations to the temple are deposited in the General Operating Fund. You may direct your donations to benefit one of our many programs such as scouting, choir, tech committee, Dharma School, ABA, SBWA, Minister Assistants, or for a capital expenditure project.

You also may contribute to the Legacy Endowment Fund (LEF), which is a long-term investment in which the principal remains untouched — only the interest generated is used. The fund is managed by financial professionals and the LEF Board. Contributions to the LEF help fulfill needs in a timely manner without undertaking major fundraising or depleting general operating funds. Specific needs include:

- Educational programs/scholarships for members, ministers, ministerial candidates, plus perpetual or periodic scholarships.
- Eitaikyo: Renovation and general maintenance of the temple shrine.

Of course, cash and checks are greatly appreciated, but donations can be in the form of automobiles, and of distributions from IRAs, stocks and bonds. Credit cards can be used at the office and online at our website, *BuddhistChurch.org*. Look for the donation button on top of the home page.

宗祖親鸞聖人は『一念多念文意』というお聖教 の中で「『凡夫』といふは、無明煩悩われらが身 にみちみちて、欲もおほく、いかり、はらだち、 そねみ、ねたむこころおほくひまなくして、臨終 の一念にいたるまで、とどまらず、きえず、たえ ず」(『註釈版聖典』, 693 頁)と私たちの煩悩は 今生の縁が尽きるまで決して無くなることはない、 とお示しであります。

では、除夜の鐘を撞くことには一体どういう意味があるのでしょうか?これは私個人の味わいで

ありますが、仏教というのは自 己がどういった存在であるかに 「気づく」ことがまず前提にあ ると考えます。しかし、その 「気づき」というのも自分が頭 で考えて気づくのではなく、仏 陀の智慧によって気付かされる のであります。



宗祖は私達の正依の聖典である『仏説無量寿 経』を和讃という七五調の詩の形としてわかりや すくお示しくださっておられます。そのご和讃の 中に「宝林・宝樹微妙音 自然清和の伎楽にて 哀婉雅亮すぐれたり 清浄楽を帰命せよ」

(『同』,563 頁)というご和讃がございます。 「お浄土というさとりの世界はとても美しく種々 の宝で彩られた林・樹々が素晴らしい音を奏でて いる。それらの音は自然なハーモニーを奏でてお り、とても優雅である。清浄な音楽を成就された 仏である阿弥陀如来に帰依しましょう」という意 味になるかと思いますが、「宗教的ではない」 人々は美しい宝で彩られた世界など信じられない と言われるかもしれません。しかし、このお浄土 というのはるとりの世界であり、さとりの世界と いうのは私達凡夫の満足することを知らない世界 とは正反対の世界であります。

さとりの世界がどういう世界であるかというと、 金・銀・瑠璃・瑪瑙などの様々な宝石がお互いに 美しい音を奏でているけれども、お互いがお互い の音を邪魔することなく自然にハーモニーを奏で るような世界であります。これは実は物事の本来 のあり方を表しています。

反対に私たちの世界は違いを尊重することを知 らず、人と違う部分は攻撃の対象となっていくよ うな世界です。音楽で言うならば、「自分の音こ そが最も大切だ!」、と主張しているようなもの です。そのような世界にある私達は自分達の姿が 見えていないことがしばしばあり、自己中心的に

さて、日本では宗教離れが進んでいると言いま すし、アメリカでも SBNR (spiritual, but not religious:スピリチュアルだが宗教的ではない) と考えている人が多いと言います。それでも大晦 日になればお寺に除夜の鐘を撞きに来て、元旦に は神社に初詣に行くという人が今でも多いのでは ないでしょうか。

私が小中高と卒業したのは石川県の金沢市で、 その当時、金沢別院へとよくお参りに行っていま した。大晦日のお参り、鐘撞きも夜遅くに始まり、 元旦の0時に修正会(元旦会)が始まるのですが、 金沢の冬は寒く、その寒さの中で食べる年越しそ ばは格段と美味しかった記憶があります。普段の 別院の朝のお参りはとても少なかったのですが、 大晦日と元旦会には多くの人が集まっていました。 それも除夜の鐘には「煩悩」を取り除くという意 味があるから、と思われているからかも知れませ ん。

しかし、残念ながら鐘を撞いたくらいでは私た ちの煩悩はなくなりません。もしなくなるのであ れば、どれだけでも鐘を撞くでしょうけれども、 そうではないから私たちは日常の生活で満足する ことのない心を満たそう満たそうとしておるわけ です。これは穴の空いたバケツに水を溜めようと しているのと似ているかもしれません。水の勢い が良ければバケツに水は溜まるかもしれませんが、 穴が空いているためにすぐにまた空っぽになって
