

In October, we're observing Eitaikyo. The name comes from a shortening of "Eitai-Dokkyo." Eitai means perpetual and Dokkyo means reading the sutras. The purpose of the service is then to read the sutras in such a way that it will be done perpetually throughout time. It traces its origins to more than 300 years ago, and although there isn't an exact historical record for the reason we perform it, other Buddhist sects began performing similar services and so it is consistent with the time period. Centuries preceding that, there have been memorial services for family members on the anniversary of the day of the death, as well as monthly memorial services, and also yearly memorial services. Eventually, there were joint services done monthly and then yearly. Thus, the creation of a yearly memorial service which commemorates more than a single family's loss.

Establishing the how, now we look to the reason why. In creating a service in which we not only recognize the rich history of any given temple but one where we perpetually recite the sutras forever means giving the opportunity to listen to the Buddhist teaching after we have passed away. The only way we can encounter it is because of the past members and the only way the future will be able to encounter it is because of us.

It is a wonderful opportunity to recognize the importance of connecting the past, present and future generations together. One of the greatest heirlooms that we can continue passing down is the dharma and by continually having this service, we promise to keep it going.

Lorinus ven with the busy months of July and August now behind us, our temple continues to stay busy with activities. The month of September included the beginning of our Dharma School 2023–24 term and the addition of two new programs: our Book Club led by Reverend Matt and the beginning of a monthly Adult Buddhist Study Class led by Reverend Yuki, with the History of Buddhism being the first topic. Our October activities include a special service on October 8 (described later in this message), the Cub Scout pancake breakfast on October 15, the start of our Betsuin Family Bowling on October 15, and the Annual Halloween Party and Haunted House sponsored by our scouts for Dharma School students and scouts on October 21.

In last month's Sangha, I wrote about the devastating wildfires that destroyed the Lahaina Hongwanji Mission. Almost immediately after the news of this tragic event, our temple began receiving generous donations from our sangha members and friends, to be earmarked to the Lahaina Hongwanji Mission to help them recover and rebuild. I have been overwhelmed by the Dana (selfless giving) of so many people. We sent an initial check in the amount of \$8,500 for donations received through August 31. On September 17, we held a kushiyaki bento fundraiser and the sales far exceeded our expectations. Proceeds of this fundraiser, along with more monetary donations, will also be forwarded to the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii for assisting the Lahaina Hongwanji. We will continue to accept donations to support our fellow Jodo Shinshu temple. Thank you to ALL who have sent in donations and/or supported our benefit fundraiser.

I'd like to thank Matt Nitta, Gordon Nitta, Marty Sakata, Kim Sakata and many other volunteers for all their hard work to make this benefit fundraiser a success. It was amazing how, in a matter of just 11 days, we sold 897 bentos, not including additional sales on the pick-up day! Orders began flowing in within minutes after we posted the online store and before we even advertised this fundraiser! This told me that so many caring people were looking for a way to help our dharma friends in Lahaina. Thank you to the Nitta and Sakata families for organizing all the cooking, packaging and distributing in such an efficient manner.

On Saturday, September 16, Team Buddhist Church of Sacramento and the ABA Walkers participated in ACC's Ohana Walk 2023. Team Buddhist Church of Sacramento consisted of 37 walkers and the ABA Walkers had 24 walkers, for a total of 61 total participants! In addition, four of our church organizations — ABA, Girl Scout Troop 569, Jr. YBA, and the Betsuin/SBWA — volunteered at four of the six checkpoint stations. As a participating nonprofit organization, our temple will receive 50% of the total pledges received by both teams. The preliminary total pledges received for both teams was over \$6,500, of which 50% will be awarded to our temple. Because many of our sangha members reside in ACC's Greenhaven Terrace and Maple Tree Village, the Board of Trustees has decided to earmark the proceeds of the Ohana Walk to support the Wednesday morning services, to help ABA defray the costs of transportation via ACC Rides and after-service refreshments to all attendees. Thank you to all donors who have supported our two teams and this important fundraiser for ACC Services. We wish to thank ACC Services for generously including our temple as a beneficiary of their fundraiser.

On Sunday, October 8, the Northern California Ministers' Association will sponsor a special service at our temple, commemorating the 800th anniversary of the establishment of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism and the 850th Birthday of the founder of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, Shinran Shonin. This special occasion was also celebrated at our head temple in Kyoto, the Nishi Hongwanji, during the month of May (Shinran Shonin's birth month). For our special October 8 service, our Northern California temples are honored to have Reverend Marvin Harada, Bishop of the Buddhist Churches of America in attendance, and Reverend Dr. David Matsumoto, President of the Institute of Buddhist Studies (IBS), as our guest speaker. A continental breakfast will be provided in the Kaikan before the 10 a.m. service, and after the service, a light lunch will be provided for all service attendees. This service will also be offered virtually on Facebook and YouTube, and it will replace our normal 9:30 a.m. service.

Please enjoy the (hopefully) moderate weather in the month of October, and I look forward to seeing you at church!



SBWA members are notified through email about all our community service projects and activities (including classes and trips). Please be sure to check your email messages so you don't miss out on the opportunity to join us!



The beads are strung together by a string that is invisible, but it is what "connects" all of the beads together. In this way, the string or the connection that we share makes us part of a group and represents "oneness and the interdependence of all."

With this explanation, our tribute to each of the former ABA members was greatly appreciated by all, especially by their peers, husbands, wives, children and grandchildren. Although it was not a very large group, it was very meaningful and a great time to reminisce about their legacy in ABA.

After the service, the Pupu Party commenced with lots of great pupu (appetizers) and drinks to be enjoyed by all. What a wonderful way to pay tribute to these former ABA members.

We would like to extend a special thanks to Reverend Yuki and Reverend Matt who conducted the service. 「永代経ってどんなお経?」

サクラメント別院では10月15日に永代経が 勤修されます。皆さんの中には「経」という文字 が付くことから「永代経」というお経典かと思わ れるかもしれませんが、「永代経」というのは法 要の名前であります。

『浄土真宗辞典』(本願寺出版社)の「永代経」の項によると「祠堂経などともいう。故人の命日ごとに永代に読経すること。また、故人を縁とした懇志を受けて特定の日に勤修される法要のこと。ある故人を縁とする初めての永代経法要は永代経開闢(かいびゃく)法要といわれる。」とまずは一般的な永代経の理解が示されています。この辞書を開くまで「祠堂経(しどうきょう)」などという言葉があるのは知りませんでしたが、「祠堂」というのは位牌を祀ってあるお堂のことだそうです。浄土真宗では位牌を用いませんので祠堂そのものも必要がなくなりますので「祠堂

では、「故人の命日ごとに永代に読経する」 云々についてはどうかというと、サクラメント別 院では現在は「祥月法要」としてお勤めされてい ます。では、浄土真宗における「永代経」とはど ういう意味合いがあるのか、『浄土真宗辞典』の 続きを見てみましょう。

経」という言い方ももちろん用いません。

「浄土真宗では、仏恩を報謝し聞法の機会を得る法要で、故人への追善供養ではなく、懇志は法座や寺院の維持存続を通して法義が永代に伝えられることを願って進納される。」とあります。先に往生された家族や友人は大切な存在でありますが、永代経法要はその方々のための追善供養ではない、と言います。追善供養というのは亡くなった人のために善を行うことで、私達が法要を行う功徳によって故人がより良い所に行けるようにと願って行うものであります。

しかし、浄土真宗のご法義というのは私たちの はからいを一切挟むことなく、阿弥陀さんのお働 きお一つで往生即成仏の仏果を得させていただく ものであり、私たちから故人に向けて善を行うというものではありません。

さて、私が小さい頃の西本願寺のスローガンは 「念仏の声を世界に子や孫に」というものでした。 考えてみますと、私たちがこうやってお念仏のみ 教えにサクラメントで出遇わせていただいている のは、故人を含む多くの方々がお寺を護ってきて くださり、多くの法要の場を設けてくださったか らでありました。この永代経法要というのは確か に追善供養ではありませんが、故人を縁として阿 弥陀さんの願いを聞かせていただく大事な法要で あり、この法要を通じてお念仏の声が世界に、子 や孫に広まっていくのではないでしょうか。

ですから、永代経法要におけるご懇志というのは法座やお寺を維持するために使われます。皆さんの「念仏の声を世界に子や孫に」という願いがまた次世代へと繋がっていくのですね。大変ありがたい法要であります。
