As we began the New Year together that day, Richard handed the responsibilities of being the Temple President to Dr. Kelvin Mark. We would like to thank Richard, Kelvin and our Board of Trustees for volunteering to take positions of such significant responsibility within our Temple leadership. With your support and guidance we will be able to continue to learn and grow as a Sangha.

During most days in the office, Tak, Meri, Rev. Bob and I have the opportunity to visit with many Sangha members who stop by. During these last couple of weeks, the most common thing that people have mentioned seems to be how cold it is outside, or how rainy it's been this winter.

This morning after I woke up, I drank coffee, checked some e-mails, and logged onto Facebook. I saw that some of my friends in Colorado Springs were excited because they had a "snow day." In Colorado, if temperatures are dangerously frigid for school buses and emergency vehicles to operate quickly and safely, or if we get more snow than the snow plows can clear from the streets, school districts cancel school. There's nothing like a "surprise vacation," even if it means that you're trapped in the house or that you're shoveling snow every few hours to stay ahead of it. Today's high was 8 degrees in Colorado Springs... now that's cold!

When I think back about the really cold places that I've lived in, I recall that throughout the winter, I usually found myself day dreaming and thinking how much nicer it would be if I was in Hawaii; swimming in the warm ocean or just relaxing on the beach and soaking up some rays.

But now, I don't think that way at all.

Five years ago during a January Youth Retreat in Seattle, it was rainy and cold, just like it has been here. Unfortunately, while at that retreat, I came down with a bad flu and was in so much pain that

my hair even hurt and I had to shield my eyes from all light. On the afternoon that everyone else went sightseeing at the water front around Pike's Market, I remember thinking to myself, "I would give anything to be healthy right now... to be able to bundle up and go outside in the cold and rain, to breathe in the fresh air, and with umbrella in hand, enjoy being with everyone else."

Nowadays, I find myself appreciating my health and my life even more. And reflecting back on the cold and snowy winter months I lived through in New York and in Colorado, I recall that there were also many good times. Even when the town would shut down for several days due to heavy snow, there were good things that happened. As neighbors and friends, we would check up on each other; and when we were stuck inside for a few days with no where to go, we were able to get catch up with friends over the phone and on the Internet. As for the winter here in Sacramento, it feels like a Colorado autumn to me, so I'm planning on golfing nine holes tomorrow morning.

What I realize today was that I was happy wherever I lived, not because of the weather or temperature, but because it was my home, I was surrounded by good friends... and I was able to enjoy wherever I might be because I was healthy.

The Buddha-Dharma is teaching me to appreciate life here and now to appreciate the cold of winter, the hot of summer, or whatever circumstance I might be living in.

This month, we will be observing our Nirvana Day service. When the Buddha attained Enlightenment, he awakened to see life as it is, and he attained perfect peace of mind. He was just like you and me, but once enlightened, his mind was different... he was able to see and accept things as they are. This is also referred to as Nirvana.

As stated so clearly by Jane Hirshfield, a poet and Zen Buddhist practitioner: **"The Buddha Woke Up to the reality that has always been there... he has always been in nirvana... our reality (and life) itself is nirvana. (Happiness and Peace) already exists within us.**

"There is no where else than here. The only gate is now. The only doorway is our own body and mind. There's nowhere to go. There's nothing else to be. There's no destination. It's not something to aim for in the afterlife. It's simply the quality of this moment... (here and now)."

I hope someday to have this perspective and appreciation for life all the time, not only when I'm suffering from a bad flu with body aches. In Jodo Shinshu, to live with true appreciation for "this moment" is to live a life of Namu Amida Butsu. Let us all try to make this our shared goal, to live a life of Nembutsu.





ED IMAI

Gary Traganza replaced two faulty circuit breakers in the foyer of the Kaikan and installed two additional fluorescent lights in the Annex middle kitchen area. Also, replaced the electrical plug that was sheared off by the swing arm of the television in the Little Hondo. Purchased and reinstalled kitchen ceiling light, with Reverend Peter's help, at his and Aileen's minister's residence.

- ✓ Melo Coloma, along with an assistant, applied three additional coats of surface protection and sealant to Kaikan floor. Melo took two days off from work on his own personal time to apply coating. Bob Chavez cleaned the flooring prior to the application. The work did not scrape off or affect the existing paint striping, Melo and his assistant merely applied coats on top of the existing paint and protective layering.

The menu is basically the same, but instead of serving diners in the Kaikan, we will be filling orders for "take-out" Japanese home-style cooked foods.

All of the food items will be prepared in the church kitchen by SBWA and ABA members. The menu items include: teriyaki chicken (half), combination sushi, maki (uncut) sushi, age sushi, chirashi, udon, Spam musubi, cabbage salad, and teriyaki sandwich.

We anticipate an early sell-out, so get your orders in quickly, no later than February 27. Using the attached order form (you may make copies or download copies from our website, www.buddhistchurch.com), fill out both sides and send in the right side with your check made out to ABA.

Orders may be turned in to the church office or given to ABA or SBWA members. We will also have some presales in the coming weeks at Sunday services, prior to the event.

On March 13, come by the Betsuin and pick up your order between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. All purchased food items will be carefully packaged and ready to eat.

Of course, some of the foods are best when reheated. In the comfort of your home while watching the Kings play and in the company of family and friends, enjoy some really delicious Japanese home-style cooked foods with the "aji" that you get only at home or at local Japanese restaurants.

Well hello there, welcome back. Don't look now, but the year 2011 is quickly becoming 1/6th over and done... can you believe that? It seems like just yesterday we were bringing in the new year, and now, it is 1/6th gone... history... never to be seen again. Just as a curiosity, when you were bringing the New Year, did you take advantage of the last two extra credit days in our attendance record-keeping system? Those extra credit days were simple and easy; all you had to do was attend the New Year's Eve Service for one extra credit, and attend the New Year's Day Service for the other. These extra credits days are simple and easy due to the fact that there are not Dharma School classes on those days, so you don't have to attend class to complete your attendance requirement. Yes, normally, throughout the year to get credit for attendance, you must attend both Dharma Service **and** Dharma School Class, and wandering the halls during either one does not qualify! So, with all the extra credit days gone for this year, please make every effort to attend on Sundays from here on out all the way to the End-of-Year Picnic.

Also please take note that our attendance system operates on a rolling calendar in that your attendance from the prior year rolls over to the beginning of the next year. Another way to put it is that no one automatically begins the new year in September at 100 percent. If you ended the prior school year in June with 100 percent, then you will carry on that percentage into the fall and new school year. Likewise, if you finish April, May and June at 59 percent, then you will begin in September with 59 percent, and therefore not eligible to play in our sports program until that number gets above 60 percent.

Since it is now February, this year's league will be winding down to finish up in February, and we certainly hope that you have enjoyed this year's basketball season. As the basketball season wraps up, all attention will turn to the 2011 tournament barrage beginning this March. The March Tournaments put an exclamation mark on the church basketball season and every March is jam-packed with tournament action. Our very own 40th annual tournament on the first weekend of March, March 4th and 5th to be exact, kicks off the 2011 tournaments, which is followed by the SJUMC Tournament on the next two weekends, and the SASF tournament will begin on Friday, March 25 and end on Sunday March 27 thus bringing a close to the March tournament action.


