ello, and welcome to the month of March. The most compelling story in the news this past month has been about the completely overlooked "all star" point guard for the New York Knicks, Jeremy Lin.

He came off the end of the bench on February 4 and made the (8-15) New York Knicks the team everyone wants to watch. What the media has dubbed "Lin-sanity" has gone global... and he has folks around the world rooting for the New York Knicks.

Why is this happening? I think it is because a very humble and unassuming, yet very talented and intelligent young man is being celebrated for inspiring his team to come together and play the game of basketball as it should be played.

Coming out of high school in Palo Alto, he was overlooked by colleges and went undrafted. As most all of us know, he played for and graduated from Harvard University... and was overlooked by the NBA. He tried out for and was cut by the Golden State Warriors and the Houston Rockets... and was sitting at the end of the Knicks bench until Saturday, February 4. Injuries left Coach D'Antoni with no alternative but to put him in the game. And the rest is becoming history.

What makes the story even better is that the Knicks were also planning to cut him, so they wouldn't have to guarantee his contract for the rest of the season!

Having been cut by two teams before, he slept on his brother's couch, knowing it was much too premature to consider having a place of his own to live. It's no wonder this phenomenon of Lin-sanity is also being called a "Lin-derella Story."

But although it seems like a storybook fantasy, his is not a Cinderella story at all. No magic got him to the ball. Jeremy Lin worked hard... and he continued to pursue his dream... even though college scouts and NBA coaches were telling him with their "rejections" that he did not have what it takes

Dharma is everywhere... all we have to do is open our eyes. And when our dharma eyes open, we see the karmic oneness of our lives with others... and we begin to live with the ever-deepening gratitude that is a life of nembutsu.

President of the Board of Trustees is the opportunities it gives you to learn about and observe the many organizations at the church, both from the invites you receive for their special services and/or functions and talking with their members. Last month, Jennifer and I attended a Boy Scout Eagle Ceremony, Cub Scout Blue and Gold Ceremony and Sport Night, Adult Buddhist Association (ABA) meeting, and the annual combined Memorial Service for Eshinni-Ko, Kakushinni-Ko and Lady Yoshiko Ohtani — the three are honored by the Buddhist Women's Association (BWA), also called the Fujinkai (Japanese name).

A common concern I heard from all the groups was the lack of new volunteers or participation by parents. How do they recruit new members? How do we get more participation from current members? What will happen if membership and participation continues to decline?

The Fujinkai is our largest affiliated organization. The membership is made up of about 100 women — not surprising; it is the Buddhist Women's Association. Their average age is late 60s to early 70s. Approximately 50% are active members. The oldest member will be 102 years old this year, the youngest in her 40s (me trying to be respectful).

They are very dedicated to their organization and the church. You rarely see the numbers of them together unless you have insomnia. During Spring Food Festival and Bazaar, they prepare sushi in the wee hours of the morning, just after midnight until mid-morning. All this so we can enjoy the freshest sushi possible. Without the dedication of these great grandmothers, great grandmothers, grandmothers, mothers and women (covering all bases), who donate their time, we wouldn't have sushi during our festivities — well, unless we buy it to sell.

It is truly a dedicated group. Just imagine our elders working through the night and early morning and the younger folks working during the day. Is there something wrong with this picture? Who do you think complains the most about working a shift? What happens when this group of women can no longer work? What happens to the tradition of making sushi and other traditional Japanese foods?

#### MINISTER ASSISTANTS CAROL CASTLE

s many of you may know, this coming March 31 marks the day that Socho Koshin Ogui, the Bishop of the Buddhist Churches of America (BCA), will retire after an amazing career of close to 49 years. Having served as Bishop for the past eight years, Socho Ogui's innovative and visionary accomplishments have touched the lives of many and influenced the growth of Jodo Shinshu in America.

Through his courage and leadership, the Minister Assistant Program (MAP) and pathway to Kaikyoshi Minister Ordination by the Hongwanji-ha were created. This first-of-its-kind program opened the door for individuals at the temple level to study Buddhism and Jodo Shinshu tradition at deeper levels, and to work and learn alongside temple ministers who serve as their mentors. It's a wonderful program for those who to want to contribute to their own temples in yet another way, and for those who are interested in possibly becoming Jodo Shinshu ministers. This past January, we congratulated our very own Reverend Peter Inokoji-Kim, who started out as an active member of the Denver Buddhist Temple and eventually went on to become the first kaikyoshi minister trained under Socho Ogui's visionary path.

In our experience, the beauty of the Minister Assistant Program (and what makes it unique) is that much of the learning occurs at the temple through the guidance and coaching of the resident minister. This way, the minister assistant learns through hands-on experience, and the minister has someone he/she can really rely on as an extra set of hands to help support the temple. Every temple seems to have a small group of people who are the backbone of the Sangha... folks who have a special connection with the temple, and who dedicate themselves, not only to taking care of the temple and its grounds, but to ensuring that the doors are open each and every week, and that all who enter feel welcome. Who better to become MAs than those who hold the well-being of Jodo Shinshu and the temple so close at heart? Maybe they can't see themselves giving a dharma talk or they don't feel comfortable leading chanting... but maybe that's OK, because that's not all this is about. There are countless ways to support the temple and the minister, and to share the dharma.

Tim and I both feel so fortunate to be a part of the Minister Assistant Program. In fact, there are no words to express just how grateful we are... not just for the experience itself, but for the many ways it has changed our lives and consequently, the lives of our daughters. Sometimes I wonder how different our lives would be... how different our perspectives would be... had we not had started down this path. We have had opportunities to learn from some amazing teachers and Buddhist scholars, and to work alongside individuals whose sincerity, dedication and hard work have truly been a source of inspiration. Without Socho's determination and belief in the Minister Assistant Program, none of this would have been possible.

I know that every temple is different, and not everyone participates in the Minister Assistant Program, but if there is an interest... and if there is a need... I hope that the option will be made available. For Tim and me, our time getting to know and work with Socho Ogui has been a gift... and one that we will always treasure, because it has introduced us to the dharma and the nembutsu path in ways that we never would have imagined eight years ago. He has been a valued teacher and leader, and we wish him and his family the very best in the future.

EARTHQUAKE AND TSUNAMI RELIEF UPDATE KELVIN MARK ard is it to imagine that it was nearly one year ago that the Tohoku region of Northern Japan was rocked by a massive magnitude 9.0 earthquake and tsunami, the widespread destruction, distress, and loss of life, unimaginable.

Responding to the news and images of strife, our community answered by collecting, organizing, and delivering 4,151 pounds of food, clothing and sundry hygiene supplies directly to the Sendai Betsuin Relief Center. Simultaneously, we participated in the Hongwanji Disaster Relief Drive via our Buddhist Churches of America.

In July 2011, our Betsuin again teamed up with the David Silva Trucking Company and Charles Yagi, then-president of the Buddhist Church of Stockton, to deliver 8,135 pounds of dried fruit, foods and sundries, which once again bypassed bureaucratic obstructions and made their way directly to badly affected areas of Sendai.

Our next effort entailed the direct purchase and delivery of winter relief gear, food and sanitation equipment, which were distributed to relief centers in Ishinomaki City and Minamisoma. Just now, we have completed our final delivery of relief aid to the Tohoku District Relief Center. All totaled, our



Buddhist Church of Sacramento volunteers and community at large enabled the delivery of \$235,000 of direct relief assistance. WOW!

Over the months, stories of mothers, fathers, children, siblings and friends trying to find one another and striving to resume a sense of normalcy have filled the news, the spirit of "gaman" and "ganbare" examples for the world to emulate and admire. There can be little doubt that dharma eyes have been opened wide to the awareness and reality of impermanence.

As RB has pointed out: "When our dharma eyes are open, we are reminded to enjoy and appreciate the wonder of each new day, knowing that it will never come again. It is with this awareness that we remember again, we must try to live our lives with the spirit of nembutsu appreciation... that level of gratitude where the words 'thank you' are never enough. Truly, if we open our eyes, the whole world is constantly teaching us the dharma."
