
RB'S CORNER REV. PETER INOKOJI-KIM



Pelcome to the month of April... the time of year that many of us put away our winter clothes, take out our summer clothes (mine will fit because of our "Dieting for Dollars" challenge), and a perfect time for spring cleaning around the house.

At home, we can also sit, breathe, and reflect on our lives in a quiet place in front of our home altar called an "obutsudan."

The obutsudan, and the mindful practice of cleaning it, serves as a reminder for each of us to reflect upon our lives, and live with awareness and appreciation,

while being mindful of the truths of impermanence and interdependence. It is proper etiquette to place our obutsudan in a central or private part of our home or dorm room, so that each time we see it, it becomes an unspoken reminder to open our dharma eyes to true reality, and find meaning in all that surrounds us.

In Buddhism, we are taught that we can learn about ourselves and about life through our six senses of touch, taste, hearing, sight, smell, and thought. The adornments in or around an obutsudan symbolize our **six senses**.

For the sense of **touch**, we place our palms together in gassho. **Taste** is symbolized by food offerings, such as rice, fruit, or something sweet. (It is not proper etiquette to put meat near the obutsudan.) The sense of **sound** is represented by a bell, **smell** is represented by incense, and Namo Amida Butsu, or nembutsu, represents our sixth sense of **thought**.

Flowers can be placed on the left, the incense burner is in the middle, and if we use a candle (battery-operated is safer), this is placed on the right. I remember it as "Light is on the right."

Flowers remind us of the impermanence of life. Although the flowers are in the peak of their beauty today, they will not be this way forever.

Incense represents purity or cleaning our hearts and minds of greed, anger, jealousy, complaints, our busy schedules, or any distraction that prevents us from feeling gratitude or from living in the moment.

The candle, or light, represents wisdom: to see things as they are... that all things are connected, and all things change.

In the *Jodo Wasan*, poems written by Shinran Shonin, Shinran wrote that "the light of wisdom dispels the darkness of selfishness and ignorance."

Around the altar, many people put pictures of loved ones who have passed away to remind us of the interconnectedness of their lives with our own. (Proper etiquette is to not place anything on top of the altar.)

An obutsudan is not something that we need to keep at home just to remember our loved ones. We can use our obutsudan in any service, such as weddings. But most importantly, our obutsudan is a constant reminder to keep our hearts and minds pure, and to live with nembutsu gratitude. It is a meaningful part of our Jodo Shinshu tradition.

If you or your family does not have an obutsudan, one of our sangha members, Jim Watkins, is a master craftsman, and his specialty is making custom contemporary obutsudans and urns. He also has the tools to laser engrave and customize his woodwork with any design, such as family crests, names, and artistic features. Jim also makes an easy-to-assemble obutsudan kit. 

MINISTER ASSISTANTS MICHIKO YUKAWA

here are hidden treasures found everywhere, so many in unexpected places and so many "hidden" in plain sight. One such treasure was our good friend "George." When we lived at the Tacoma Buddhist Temple, George would drop by during the week to check on things around the temple, often bringing us seasonal fruits and vegetables that he had grown on his farm. He was a small, wiry person, a man of few words but honest, kind and generous, always ready to help out whenever or wherever he could.

George had a passion for recycling long before it became an environmentally encouraged activity. He would make sure that there were enough flattened used cardboard boxes to tape down on the kitchen floors whenever food was prepared for temple fundraisers. This not only saved wear and tear on the floors, but it provided a comforting cushion for tired feet from standing for long hours, as well as making clean-up afterwards much easier. When the event was over, George would take the piles of used cardboard to the recycling center. He also provided large plastic recycled shoyu pails for the vegetable peelings and scraps, coffee grounds, used newspapers, etc., which he would turn into compost. Of course, he would then share the resulting fresh and tasty fruits and vegetables with friends and temple members.

When George retired and left his farm, he continued to garden, turning an open space next to the temple or empty lots next to the homes of friends into thriving mini-farms and gardens. By planting flowering shrubs around the border of the dry, grassy lot next to the temple, he turned a somewhat embarrassing eyesore into a welcoming walk to the temple door.

More recently, when he became unable to garden as before and could not grow his produce, he began stopping in at the Tacoma Tofu Company, which is not a retail store but distributes tofu through wholesalers. However, George, acquainted with the owner and workers, would purchase cardboard trays of tofu, put them into the church refrigerators and tell the temple members attending service to be sure and take a fresh tofu home!

Being a modest man of few words, George was not one to boast about his own accomplishments. Only recently during an interview of our temple keiro members, we learned that George had not only served in the 442nd Regimental Combat Team of the U.S. Army during World War II, but he had been a part of the team that had rescued the "Lost Battalion," for which he received a Purple Heart! Helping others, doing whatever needed to be done to accomplish that goal. Even as a youth, he was true to his nature.

There are hidden treasures all around us. We have dharma teachers all around us. We need only to "open our dharma eyes," as Reverend Bob always says, "to truly see what we have not seen before," as Reverend Yukawa always says.



Although they all expressed a little anger concerning the circumstances of their injuries, they were not angry people. In fact, they were all thankful that people were helping them, and expressing concern for us and their injured friends and family. None expressed deep regrets nor deep anger about their current circumstances, instead focusing on what needed to be done for them and their friends to survive and get better.

How different from so many who I have met, that like the man shot by the arrow so long ago, dwell upon the injuries and not the cure! Although all of these people were listed as having a Christian religion, their focus was on NOW, not the past, and not the far future. These people illustrated for me that we do not live Buddhist or Christian lives; we simply live human life, and all too suddenly it can be threatened by unforeseeable events. Look around us, really look, and appreciate what we have now.

April is another busy time at the Betsuin with Hanamatsuri and the play featured the second weekend. Dress rehearsal for the play will be Saturday, April 13 at 7 p.m.! Please look for announcements from your classes concerning when to show up! That afternoon, the 8th grade class will assemble the Hanamido (flower shrine), and anyone else who would like to participate is invited to show up too!
